### **How It Works**

SHE WRITES PRESS editorial solutions are a cornerstone of our commitment to our authors, and we have established three specific tracks for authors who submit their works to SWP.

#### Track 1. Green Light/Good to Go

Track 1 is for those SWP authors who are ready for publication. If we determine that you have a publish-ready manuscript, you will proceed directly into the production process, meaning your manuscript will go straight to layout (designed pages).

### Track 2. Copyediting

(not included in the She Publishes package)

Track 2 is for those SWP authors whose manuscript requires something heavier than a proofread. We offer a brief assessment of your work in order to point you to the places in your manuscript that have deemed it in need of a copyedit. We do not require that you get your copyedit done by SHE WRITES PRESS.

### Track 3. Developmental Editing/Coaching

(not included in the She Publishes package)

Track 3 is for those authors who require more than a copyedit. We will recommend that these authors work with one of SWP's coaches for developmental editing and/or coaching. Your manuscript would qualify for this kind of service if we see inconsistencies in your story, the need for character and/or scene development, point of view problems, or lack of structure.

#### **Proofreading**

(included in the She Publishes package)

All authors publishing on SHE WRITES PRESS will have their final manuscript proofread after their project has been laid out (designed). Our ultimate goal is that every SWP book mirror a traditional publishing model, and we strive to publish error-free books.


### Splitting the Difference





## Americashire A Field Guide to a Marriage Jennifer Richardson

A couple's decision about whether or not to have a child plays out against the backdrop of their new home in the English countryside.

When an American woman and her British husband decide to buy a two-hundred-year-old cottage in the heart of the Cotswolds, they're hoping for an escape from their London lives. Instead, their decision about whether or not to have a child plays out against a backdrop of village fêtes, rural rambles, and a cast of eccentrics clad in corduroy and tweed.

Americashire begins with the simultaneous purchase of a Cotswold cottage and Richardson's



ill-advised decision to tell her grandchild-hungry parents that she is going to try to have a baby. As she transitions from urban to rural life, she is forced to confront both her ambivalence about the idea of motherhood and the reality of living with a spouse who suffers from depression. Then, just when she is finally settling into English country life, she is struck by an attack of non-alcohol-related slurring that turns out to be a symptom of multiple sclerosis. Her indecision about moving forward with motherhood is brought to a head when her neurologist tells her that pregnancy may actually decrease her risk of developing full-blown MS.

Part memoir, part travelogue—and including field guides to narrative-related Cotswold walks —Americashire is a candid, compelling tale of marriage, illness, and difficult life decisions.





Knowledge reflects the belief that women's studies is as much about institutional change as it is about content. The first section provides an overview of the conceptual frameworks Fox O'Barr developed to analyze institutions and their hesitancy to embrace change; the second describes how she created feminist change and found the frameworks for explaining it to others; and the third is retrospective in tone, reflecting on lessons learned over four decades of doing this work.

Feminists will find both examples and inspiration in Fox O'Barr's essays on how to change the institutions they are a part of and expand and transform the knowledge we all share.



Now retired, **JEAN FOX O'BARR** founded and led the Duke University Women's Studies Program for two decades. She is a premier feminist thinker, educator, and activist, and an author of many books, including *Women Imagine Change* and *Feminism in Action*. She is a former editor in chief of SIGNS: Journal of Women in Culture and Society.


### **Warrior Mother**






